
We are here for you

Eye & Tissue Donation



Your loved one may have the opportunity to create a legacy of life-giving generosity by becoming an organ, eye & tissue donor.



Organ, eye & tissue donation changes lives

Perhaps you know someone who was on dialysis and received a new kidney, or had surgery for a torn ligament, a bone transplant to avoid amputation, a heart valve surgery or a spinal fusion surgery. They were helped by an organ or tissue donor.

Donation may help your family, too. It can be healing to know that your loved one's gifts have saved or helped others and that they have left a generous legacy after their passing.

Gift of Hope Organ & Tissue Donor Network is the not-for-profit organization that coordinates organ and tissue donation with hospitals, supports families of donors and provides public education on donation in Illinois and northwest Indiana.

How donation works

When someone passes away, Gift of Hope determines if they can become an organ or tissue donor.

A representative from Gift of Hope may contact their close family members to discuss the process and answer any questions.

Gift of Hope gathers more information about the potential donor using a health questionnaire, medical records and lab tests.

Then, organ or tissue recovery surgery is scheduled, working closely with the hospital or coroner and keeping the family informed.

Planning a service after donation

Gift of Hope will work closely with your funeral home to ensure that you may hold the type of funeral or service your family has been planning, and that donation can still occur. There is no cost to the donor's family or estate for donation and every donor's dignity is preserved throughout the donation process.

Talk with your funeral director about ways your loved one's gift of donation may be honored in their end-of-life services.
